

The Pelham City Council convened at 7:00 p.m., November 6, 1995. Willard Payne led the invocation and Mayor Hayes asked that the record show all members of the city council present.

Karyl Rice moved to approve the October 16, 1995, minutes as written. Ken Maynard seconded the motion and all approved.

There was no old business to come before the council.

During new business, Ordinance No. 182-2 amending the tennis permit ordinance was introduced. Ken Maynard moved to suspend the rules for immediate consideration. Thereupon, Willard Payne moved to approve Ordinance No. 182-2 as presented. Karyl Rice seconded the motion and all approved.

Mayor Hayes announced the first reading of Tow Away Ordinance No. 277. The city council will review and vote at the next meeting.

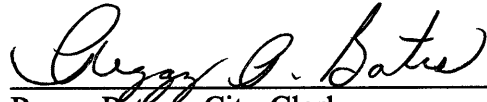
Mayor Hayes read a proclamation for National Bible Week, November 19-26, 1995.
